

Yale's endowment earned a 6.8% investment return (net of fees) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020, increasing the endowment's value from \$30.3 billion on June 30, 2019, to \$31.2 billion on June 30, 2020.


Spending from the endowment—which is the largest source of revenue for the university and supports faculty salaries, student scholarships, and other expenses—for fiscal year 2021 is projected to be \$1.5 billion, representing approximately 35% of the university's net revenues. Endowment distributions to the operating budget have increased at an annualized rate of 7.9% over the past twenty years. Those distributions support, among other priorities, Yale's commitment to meeting the full financial need of every student enrolled in Yale College.

The university's longer-term results remain in the top tier of institutional investors. Yale's endowment returned 9.9% per annum over the twenty years ending June 30, 2020. Relative to the estimated 5.6% average return of college and university endowments, over the past twenty years Yale's investment performance added \$25.9 billion of value in the form of increased spending and enhanced endowment value. During the twenty-year period, the endowment grew from \$10.0 billion to \$31.2 billion.
